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Places in Leicestershire - Harborough

The map on page 6 shows Harborough District, including the main towns and the key rural service centres.

Introduction

The purpose of this “Places in Leicestershire” report is to highlight the priorities for individual places in Leicestershire. This will enable us to identify place based priority outcomes for inclusion in the Leicestershire Sustainable Community Strategy and Local Area Agreement.

The seven reports covering Leicestershire are divided into chapters structured around the key places in each District, arranged by the 27 Community Forums currently being established around the County.

The map on page 7 shows the location of the 27 Community Forums in Leicestershire. There are 5 Community Forums in Harborough District.

Types of Places

The key places are divided into:

Main Towns – these 17 settlements are identified in the Local Area Agreement as key large service centres which provide health services, employment, education, leisure and shopping facilities for the surrounding population

Priority Neighbourhoods – identified in the Local Area Agreement 2006-09, these 19 neighbourhoods are small areas of the county with bigger than average problems, usually in relation to a number of aspects of deprivation (see Indices of Deprivation below)

Rural/Service Centres – these are smaller service centres, identified through the Leicestershire Rural Partnership, that provide a range of facilities for the surrounding rural villages and hamlets. They vary in size, but they are all a focal point for a cluster of smaller settlements

Rural Areas – this section of each chapter covers the rural parts of each Forum area and identifies the priorities, based on aspects of deprivation identified through the Indices of Deprivation, poor access to services (Access to Services report) or specific needs identified through a Parish Plan (see below).




Map I - Harborough District

Information Sources

A range of information sources have been used to develop these sections, a short description of each is below:

Indices of Deprivation 2004 - The Indices are produced by the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister with the aim of measuring deprivation in a consistent way across England. The indices include measures relating to Income Deprivation, Employment Deprivation, Health Deprivation and Disability, Education, Skills and Training Deprivation, Barriers to Housing and Services, Living Environment Deprivation and Crime. Leicestershire is ranked 135 out of the 149 county/unitary authorities in England (where 149 = least deprived).

Super Output Areas

Super Output Area (SOA) lower level is a new national geography created by the Office for National Statistics. These areas are created by combining a number of Output Areas (created for the 2001 Census). LSOAs are areas of broadly consistent population size across the country - approximately 1,500 people. They are often referred to in the text as LSOAs.

If a LSOA is described as experiencing moderate levels of deprivation, this means that it is in the bottom 20% of LSOAs in Leicestershire. Where a LSOA is described as experiencing significant deprivation, it is in the bottom 10% in Leicestershire.

Town and Village Centres Survey - This work was carried out by BMG Research on behalf of Leicestershire County Council and Leicestershire Economic Partnership in 2006. The research was based upon a customer satisfaction survey of visitors and users in the 17 Main Towns identified above. A main report is accompanied by a shorter report for each individual town or village centre.

Parish Plans – a parish plan is led by a cross-section of local people and focussed around the outcomes of a questionnaire survey, which are analysed and used to produce a summary report and action plan. More than 25% of parishes in Leicestershire have conducted a Parish Plan - this report focuses on Parish Plans completed over the last 3 years.

Access to Services report – this research by the Leicestershire Rural Partnership identifies the number of service outlets and the diversity of the service types within each Leicestershire parish under 5,000 population. Five groups of parishes have been identified, based on a similarity in their service coverage and diversity.

Group 1: No services or skeletal service provision

Group 2: Minimal service provision

Group 3: Medium service provision

Group 4: Good service provision

Group 5: Very good service provision

This report highlights parishes with no, skeletal or minimal service provision.

Social Capital Survey – The Social Capital Survey (2006) targeted 20 Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) across the County. These were identified by the District Local Strategic Partnerships and covered “deprived”, “average” and “rural” communities. The survey work was conducted mainly by volunteers who surveyed 10% of the adult population in each area.

I. Market Harborough Community Forum Area

The map overleaf (Map 3) shows the Market Harborough Community Forum with LSOAs and Neighbourhood Priority Area.

The Forum consists of the town of Market Harborough and, within the town, a priority neighbourhood.

I.1 Main Towns

I.1.1 Market Harborough

Indices of multiple deprivation

The Indices of Multiple Deprivation data will be provided within the Neighbourhood Profile.

Leicestershire Town and Village Centre Survey 2006

Overall, respondents were positive about the environment and facilities in and around the centre of Market Harborough.

Having a greater range of shops, more specialist shops and more leisure facilities were seen as the areas that needed the most improvement.

Groups of people hanging around on the streets, dirty pavements and chewing gum, rubbish and litter lying around were seen as the most significant problems in Market Harborough.

Welland Market Towns – Measuring the performance of Town Centres, Market Harborough

The study was completed in February 2007. A number of key conclu-

sions can be drawn from the study;

Overall the town has a high satisfaction rating amongst those surveyed in the study.

The town appears to perform well compared to other similar towns

Market Harborough On Street Survey

The survey was conducted in June 2006. A number of key issues arise from the survey

Overall visitors are satisfied with most aspects of the town

There is significant dissatisfaction with the public toilet and baby changing facilities and some dissatisfaction with the street furniture



The key improvement desired was the improvement of leisure facilities particularly for young people.

I.2 Priority Neighbourhoods

I.2.1 Central Market Harborough

2. Lutterworth Community Forum Area

The map overleaf (Map 4) shows the Lutterworth Community Forum with LSOAs.

The Forum consists of the main town of Lutterworth and the surrounding rural area. There are no Priority Neighbourhoods within this Community Forum area.

2.1 Main Towns

2.1.1 Lutterworth

Indices of multiple deprivation

The town of Lutterworth is covered (mainly) by 1 LSOA; Lutterworth Centre and East (E01025792). The edges of the town are discussed in Section 2.2 below.

The area exhibits moderate deprivation in relation to the living environment and the number of older people living in income deprived households.

Leicestershire Town and Village Centre Survey 2006

Overall, respondents were positive about the environment and facilities in and around the centre of Lutterworth.

A greater range of shops, more specialist shops and the cleanliness and tidiness of the centre were seen as the areas that needed the most attention in Lutterworth.

Rubbish and litter lying around, groups of people hanging round the streets and vandalism, graffiti and other deliberate damage to property

or vehicles were seen as the most significant problems in Lutterworth.

Nearly three-fifths of respondents said policing in Lutterworth was insufficient and should be increased whereas 35% said it was about right.

Welland Market Towns – Measuring the performance of Town Centres, Lutterworth

The study was completed in February 2007. The conclusions from the study include:

Overall Lutterworth gives “a clear impression of a town on the margins of retailing appeal and success”

The town has a high satisfaction rate amongst visitors

There is significant dissatisfaction with the retail offer of the town

Lutterworth on Street Survey

The survey was conducted in June 2006. A number of key issues arise from the survey

Overall visitors are satisfied with most aspects of the town

There is significant dissatisfaction with the public toilet and baby changing facilities.


The three key improvements desired were the removal of heavy vehicles through the town, pedestrianisation and an improved range and variety of shops.

Lutterworth Vision and Master Plan

The Vision and Master Plan was produced in August 2006 and identifies a similar range of issues. Two conclusion from the baseline study stand out;

Map 4 - Lutterworth Community Forum

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Despite horrendous traffic problems, the town centre is not in imminent threat of terminal decline. People and the place endure, but the town centre carries on underachieving.

Fundamental to this ambition, is addressing the traffic issue.

2.2 Rural Areas

Indices of multiple deprivation

The remainder of the Lutterworth Community Forum Area is covered by 4 LSOAs.

Two of these areas, Lutterworth West LSOA (E01025790) and Lutterworth South LSOA (E01025791) exhibit moderate deprivation in terms of barriers to housing and services.

Parish Plans

One Parish Plan has been completed in the Forum Area, Claybrooke Magna and Claybrooke Parva, completed in 2006 / 2007. The key issues identified in the plan include:

- Increase use of the church for community events
- Re-launch the neighbourhood watch scheme and surgeries with police
- Increase services at the village hall
- Want only limited development in the village
- Improve maintenance of playground

3. Rural West Community Forum Area

The map overleaf (Map 5) shows the Rural West Community Forum with LSOAs.

The Forum consists of the main town of Broughton Astley, the key rural centre of Husbands Bosworth and the surrounding rural area. There are no Priority Neighbourhoods within this Community Forum area.

3.1 Main Towns

3.1.1 Broughton Astley

Indices of multiple deprivation

Broughton Astley is covered by 3 LSOAs; Broughton Astley West (E01025772), Broughton Astley South (E01025773) and Broughton Astley North (E01025774). The indices do not indicate any significant or moderate deprivation in the area.

Leicestershire Town and Village Centre Survey 2006

Overall, respondents were positive about the environment and facilities in and around the centre.

Having a greater range of shops and more specialist shops were seen as the areas that needed the most improvement.

Rubbish and litter lying around, groups of people hanging around the street and street canvassers were seen as the most significant problems in Broughton Astley.

Health Check Report

The Health Check was completed in 2004 and the key findings included:

- Need to improve signage and gateways to the village
- There is a problem with a lack of affordable housing
- Improve community facilities and activities for young people
- Improve access to dentistry
- Traffic congestion during the school run
- Poor bus service except to Leicester, and no bus links to nearby rail stations

Social Capital Survey

The social capital survey was conducted in Primethorpe part of Broughton Astley LSOA (E01025775)


Respondents to the survey from Primethorpe had a stronger than average sense of belonging to their Local Authority District and Leicestershire.

On average, people in Primethorpe have strong networks – of neighbours, friends and family – than the average of other areas surveyed. Also, more people in Primethorpe than the average of other areas said that people in their neighbourhood could be trusted.

Fewer people said they had participated in volunteering activities or given unpaid help in Primethorpe than the average. However, more people than average in this area said that it is important to them to contribute to their community.

People in Primethorpe are more likely than the average of the other areas to vote in Parish Council Elections.

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The proportion of those surveyed who were satisfied with the delivery of public services was higher (82%) compared to the survey as a whole (71%)

A higher proportion of those surveyed (27%) compared to the survey as a whole (16%) felt they could influence the decisions affecting their area.

3.2 Key Rural Centres

3.2.1 Husbands Bosworth

Indices of multiple deprivation

The LSOA for Husbands Bosworth (Bosworth, Kilworth and Mowsley E01025771) covers a significant rural area as well as the town

Parish Plan

Husbands Bosworth Parish Plan was completed in 2006 / 2007. The key issues identified in the plan included:

- A regular police surgery
- Re-launch the neighbourhood watch scheme
- Improve local tourist information
- Desire for adult education courses, particularly for computing
- More affordable and sheltered housing
- Improve and widen footpaths and improve access to buildings for the disabled
- Improve the Church Hall Facilities
- Pollution from traffic
- Need traffic calming

3.3 Rural Areas

Indices of multiple deprivation

The rural area of the Rural West Community Forum is covered by 6 LSOAs.

None of these exhibit any significant or moderate multiple deprivation. Three of the LSOAs; Ashby, Frolesworth and Dunton (E01025777), Mistrerton, Gilmorton, and Swinford (E010252808) and Peatling, Bruntingthorpe, Kimcote and Walton (E01025810) exhibit significant deprivation in terms of barriers to services and housing.

One other LSOA; Bosworth (E01025771) exhibits moderate deprivation in terms of barriers to services and housing.

Parish Plans

Three Parish Plans have been completed in the Rural West Community Forum area.

Cotesbach Parish Plan was completed in 2006 / 2007. The key issues identified in the plan included:

- Create more community activities related to heritage and environment
- Increase use of the church as a community centre
- Greater police presence desired
- Multi-sports court for young people
- More housing for retired and disabled people
- Want a post office
- Pollution from low flying aircraft
- Litter from nearby landfill activities

- Want to have no street lighting (Light pollution)
- Against the proposed extension of the landfill and extraction site
- Poor grass mowing service

Frolesworth Parish Plan was completed in 2004 / 2005. The key issues identified in the plan included:

- Re-establish the pub
- Establish a shop and post office
- Improve access to training such as IT
- Hold more village events
- Reduce the speed limit to 20 mph

Swinford Parish Plan was completed in 2005 / 2006. The key issues identified in the plan included:

- Improve TV reception
- Establish a post office
- More adult education courses particularly ICT
- Noise pollution from the motorway
- Speeding traffic
- Provide sheltered housing and low cost first time buyer housing

Access to services report

The report identifies the following parishes as having no services or skeletal services;

- Claybrooke Magna
- Knaptoft
- Westrill and Starmore
- Bittesby

The report identifies the following parishes as having minimal services;

- Ashby Magna
- Claybrooke Parva
- Frolesworth
- Shawell

4. Mid Rural Community Forum Area

The map overleaf (Map 6) shows the Mid Rural Community Forum with LSOAs.

The Forum consists of the key rural centres of Great Glen, Kibworth and Fleckney and the surrounding rural areas. There are no Main Towns or Priority Neighbourhoods within this Community Forum area.

4.1 Key Rural Centres

4.1.1 Great Glen

Indices of multiple deprivation

Great Glen is covered by a single LSOA; Great Glen Centre (E01025782). The area does not exhibit significant or moderate deprivation.

4.1.2 Kibworth

Indices of multiple deprivation

The main centre of Kibworth is covered by a single LSOA; Kibworth Beauchamp (E01025785).

The area exhibits moderate income deprivation and moderate levels of children living in income deprived households.

Parish Plan

The Kibworth Parish Plan was completed in 2004/ 2005. The key issues identified in the study include

- Odour from the Recycling and Household Waste site
- Access for the disabled and visually impaired to some shops and services (including kerb heights)
- Desire for an advice centre for young people (bullying, drugs, sex, etc.)
- Calls for a bypass to remove heavy traffic from the village (Is this actually going ahead?)
- Better and safer cycle routes and secure cycle locking facilities in the town
- Pressure on the local schools from numbers
- More school holiday activities required
- Need to grow local employment (though not through “industrial development”)
- Increased housing provision is not reflected in improved infrastructure
- Need for better access to sports and leisure activities for young people

4.1.3 Fleckney

Indices of multiple deprivation


Fleckney is covered by 3 LSOAs; Fleckney Centre and South (E01025778), Fleckney East (E01025779) and Fleckney North (E01025780). The area does not exhibit significant or moderate deprivation.

Social Capital Survey

The survey was conducted in Fleckney Centre and South LSOA E01025778.

From the results of the survey, Fleckney is comparable with the average

of all other areas surveyed in terms of people feeling they belong to their neighbourhood and that their neighbourhood is a good place to live.

Less people in Fleckney said they had spoken to someone outside their household (not including work) on the phone or by visiting, than the average of the other areas surveyed.

Fewer people in Fleckney had contacted a local councillor or MP in the last year compared with the average for other areas surveyed. Also fewer had attended a public meeting or neighbourhood forum to discuss local issues or had helped organise a petition on a local issue.

In Fleckney fewer people than average voted in General and District Council Elections than the average of other areas surveyed in Leicestershire.

4.2 Rural Areas

Indices of multiple deprivation

The rural area of the Mid Rural Community Forum is covered by 7 LSOAs.

The area experiences some significant deprivation in terms of access to services and housing and moderate deprivation in terms of employment.

This is summarised in the table opposite.

Access to services report

The report identifies the parishes of Kibworth Harcourt, Carlton Curlieu, West Langton, and Thorpe Langton as having no services or skeletal services.

The report identifies the parishes of East Langton, Saddington, Laughton and Theddingworth as having minimal services.

5. Rural East Community Forum Area

The map overleaf (Map 7) shows the Rural East Community Forum with LSOAs.

The area consists of the key rural centre of Billesdon and the surrounding rural area. There are no Main Towns or Priority Neighbourhoods within this Community Forum area.

5.1 Key Rural Centres

5.1.2 Billesdon

Indices of multiple deprivation

The LSOA covering Billesdon also covers a significant large rural area and so this information is included in 5.2 Rural Areas below.

Parish Plan

Billesdon Parish Plan was prepared in 2006 / 2007. The key issues identified in the plan include;

- Need for more active police presence
- More neighbourhood help needed for vulnerable people
- Need to expand the provision at the youth club
- Improvement of the play area to make it more “challenging”
- Better mobility access on pavements
- Desire to reduce the environmental impact of the village

5.2 Rural Areas

Indices of multiple deprivation

The rural area of the Rural East Community Forum is covered by 7 LSOAs.

Three of these areas; Hallaton, Great Easton & Medbourne LSOA (E01025809), Greater Billesdon LSOA (E01025770) and Tilton, Hungarton and Tugby LSOA (E01025815) all exhibit significant deprivation in terms of access to services and housing.

Greater Billesdon LSOA also exhibits moderate deprivation in terms of the living environment.

Parish Plans

There have been 4 Parish Plans completed in the area.


Hallaton Parish Plan was prepared in 2006 / 2007. The key issues identified included:

- Need for a playground
- More youth provision required
- Improve liaison with the local police
- Re-invigorate Neighbourhood Watch
- Increase availability of housing for local people
- Improve the stock in the mobile library

Medbourne Parish Plan was prepared in 2004 / 2005. The key issues identified included:

- Need for after schools clubs

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- Need for a nursery school / playgroup
- Increased provision of adult education
- Poor public transport links with Market Harborough and Corby
- Improved lighting

Stoughton Parish Plan was prepared in 2004 / 2005. The key issues identified included:

- Improved maintenance of verges and hedgerows
- More playground equipment needed and a larger village hall
- Better access to IT training course and other adult education
- Need for more flexible public transport for the young
- Concern about the development of more housing on the Co-op farm site

Thurnby and Bushby Parish Plan was prepared in 2006 / 2007. The key issues identified included:

- Relaunch Neighbourhood Watch
- A meeting place for young people is needed
- Appointment of a Community Support Officer
- More affordable housing is required
- Extend the hours of bus services
- Open up the library to enable children to make more use of it
- More activities for children during school holidays
- IT education courses needed
- More recreational provision for the elderly required
- Maintain the Green Wedge
- Energy saving measures in new buildings
- Maintain the “habitat” space in the Parish

Social Capital Survey

The Social Capital Survey was conducted in Tilton, Hungarton and Tugby LSOA (E01025815).

Respondents to the survey from Tilton-on-the-Hill were stronger in perceptions of neighbourliness, including the feeling that their neighbourhood was a tight-knit community, a friendly place, where people look out for one another and that overall it was a good place to live.

They were also stronger than average in feeling that their neighbourhood was one where people from different backgrounds got on well together and were happy living among people of different lifestyles.

Compared to the average, respondents were more likely to feel that people could be trusted—both generally and within their neighbourhood—and that neighbours would help each other.

In terms of formal volunteering (more than two hours a week to groups) and informal volunteering (to friends and neighbours) people in Tilton-on-the-Hill were comparable with the average for all areas surveyed in Leicestershire.

Respondents to the survey were also stronger than average in terms of ‘joining-in’, for example, by attending local groups and meetings, or contacting the media or elected members regarding local issues.

Access to services report

The report identifies the parishes of Illston-on-the-Hill and Marefield as having no services or skeletal services.


