Total Crime (Section 4) <div>pages</div>	-	No Hinckley and Bosworth Borough had an overall 11% reduction in total recorded offences over the last five years. It is the only district across Leicestershire to have a significantly greater reduction in total recorded offences compared to the overall county reduction between 2003/04 and 2007/08. Also, the total number of recorded offences in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough in the first six months of 2008/09 is lower than in the previous year to date.	No Hinckley and Bosworth Borough has a total crime rate per 1,000 population similar to the County as a whole, but is considerably lower compared to both the Force area and nationally. Hinckley and Bosworth Borough has an average total crime rate compared to similar areas.	Yes The total crime rates for 'urban', 'town and fringe' and 'village' areas within Hinckley and Bosworth Borough are similar to the county. However, although only 1% of the population live in the most rural areas of the Borough, these areas have the highest crime rate across the county compared to all other areas. There is little variation between the total crime rates between the different communities across Hinckley and Bosworth Borough (as classified by OAC). However, there is a relatively small proportion of residents who live in 'City Living' and 'Constrained by Circumstances' communities, who are disproportionately affected by crime. There is only 1 area out of the 20 areas within the county with a significantly high volume of crime, within Hinckley and Bosworth Borough: Hinckley Town Centre.	No Respondents in Hinckley and Bosworth District are most concerned about the possibility of being a victim of burglary, vehicle crime and physical attack. In general, respondents in Hinckley and Bosworth District are equally concerned about crime issues compared to respondents from the rest of the county.	Victims in Leicestershire are significantly more likely to be male rather than female, and aged between 18 and 44. Considering both police recorded and non-recorded offences in Leicestershire, the ethnic profile of a victim is unlikely to affect their likelihood of victimisation. Victims of total crime are much more likely to live in the OAC areas of either 'Blue Collar', 'City Living', 'Constrained by Circumstances', 'Multicultural' or 'Typical Traits', which in terms of the Urban and Rural classification, translates into 'Urban' areas.

No Recorded criminal damage offences in Hinckley & Bosworth Borough, have followed the same trend as the County over the last five years, reaching a five-year high in 2006/07. The number of criminal damage offences recorded in 2007/08 is now at a comparable level with five years ago. Also, the number of criminal damage offences recorded in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough in the first six months of 2008/09 is lower than in the previous year to date.	No Hinckley and Bosworth Borough has a criminal damage rate per 1,000 population similar to the County as a whole. Also, Hinckley and Bosworth Borough has an average criminal damage rate compared to similar local authorities.	Yes The rate of criminal damage offences across the 'urban' and 'rural' areas of Hinckley and Bosworth is similar to the county profile, with the exception of 'hamlet and isolated dwelling' areas. These areas have a disproportionately high rate of criminal damage. However, they account for only 1% of criminal damage offences across the whole Borough. The rate of criminal damage offences across the OAC communities in Hinckley and Bosworth is similar to the county profile. 1 of the 16 areas within the county with a significantly high volume of criminal damage is within Hinckley and Bosworth Borough: Hinckley Town Centre.	No The proportion of respondents in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough who felt that 'Vandalism' was a problem in their local area was similar to the proportion of respondents in the rest of the county. In Hinckley and Bosworth Borough, out of 11 aspects of anti-social behaviour, 'Vandalism' was ranked as the 5th biggest problem, behind 'Speeding Vehicles' and 'Teenagers hanging around on the street', 'uncontrolled dogs and dog messes' and 'rubbish and litter'.	Victims of criminal damage in Leicestershire are significantly more likely to be male. There are significantly fewer BME victims of criminal damage offences in Leicestershire considering the total county BME population. Compared to both the total population and to all other victims, criminal damage victims are much more likely to be aged between 30 to 44 years, and are equally unlikely to be aged either under 18 or over 60.

The number of ASB incidents reported in 2007/08 is similar to the number reported in 2006/07. <div>45 - 46</div>	- The ASB incident rate per 1,000 population in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough is similar to the county rate. <div>-</div>	Yes The rate of ASB incidents across the 'urban' and 'rural' areas of Hinckley and Bosworth is similar to the county profile, with a disproportionately high rate of offences recorded in 'urban' areas. The rate of ASB incidents across the OAC communities in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough is similar to the county profile. However, the potential consequence of these incidents does not allow a sensible comparison with other problems. <div>47</div>	No In 2007/08, a total of 208 deliberate fires were recorded in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough, compared to 239 in the previous year <div>47</div>	- The deliberate fire rate per 1,000 population in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough is slightly higher compared to the county rate. Other comparable data is not currently available. <div>-</div>	Yes Approximately three-quarters of deliberate fires in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough are recorded in 'urban' areas. However, only 1% of the Borough population live in the 'hamlet and isolated dwelling' areas, but are victim to 6% of all deliberate fires recorded in the Borough. The district trend was in line with the county trend over the five-year period. Also, the number of violence against the person offences recorded in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough in the first six months of 2008/09 is lower than in the previous year to date. <div>57 - 58</div>	No The violence against the person rate in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough is similar compared to the county rate. <div>-</div>	Yes The violence against the person offence rates across 'urban' and 'rural' areas of Hinckley and Bosworth are similar compared to the whole county. However, the scale of the problem is under-represented due to the serious nature of these offences, the emotional cost to the individuals, and resources required by agencies to deal with them. <div>59</div>	No The number of serious violent crimes has continually reduced in the Borough over the last five years, reaching a five-year low in 2007/08. This follows a similar trend to the whole county. Hinckley and Bosworth had a significantly bigger reduction in serious acquisitive crime compared to the other districts in Leicestershire. Burglary Dwelling (Section 7.3) <div>pages</div>	No Recorded burglary dwelling offences accounted for 6% of police recorded crime in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough during 2007/08. <div>33 - 34</div>	No Hinckley and Bosworth Borough experienced a 16% reduction in the number of recorded burglary dwelling offences in the last five years, in line with the county trend. Also, the number of burglary dwelling offences recorded in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough in the first six months of 2008/09 is lower than in the previous year to date. <div>77 - 78</div>	No Hinckley and Bosworth Borough has a burglary dwelling offence rate similar to the county average. However, compared to similar local authorities Hinckley and Bosworth Borough has a burglary dwelling offence rate in the bottom (worst) 25% of all similar areas within its group. <div>79 - 80</div>	Yes The burglary dwelling offence rates across 'urban' and 'rural' areas of Hinckley and Bosworth are similar compared to the whole county. There is little variation between the burglary dwelling rates for 'urban' and 'rural' areas of Hinckley and Bosworth Borough. 2 out of the 21 areas in Leicestershire with a significantly high number of burglary dwelling offences are within Hinckley and Bosworth Borough: Barwell Centre and Hinckley Trinity West. <div>79 - 84</div>	Yes The respondents of Hinckley and Bosworth Borough were most worried about being a victim of burglary when considering the list of eight possible crime categories. <div>28 - 29</div>	The highest risk group for burglary dwelling are females aged over 66 years and living in the urban and rural classified 'Village' areas. Similarly males of the same age group and living in the same areas are also a high risk target. Both profiles fit well with known targets of distraction burglary. Other high risk groups include females living in city centre areas, classified by OAC as either 'Multicultural' or 'City Living' and aged between 18 and 27 years of age; along with individuals of Black and Minority ethnic background, of the same age and living in OAC classified 'Blue Collar Communities', 'Constrained by Circumstances' or 'Typical Trait' areas. <div>103</div>
Vehicle Crime (Section 7.13) <div>pages</div>	No Vehicle crimes accounted for 11% of all recorded offences within Hinckley and Bosworth Borough in 2007/08. <div>93 - 94</div>	No Hinckley and Bosworth Borough, with the exception of an increase in vehicle crime in 2006/07 of 22%, had a year-on-year decrease in vehicle crime totalling 41%. This was the largest reduction of any of the Leicestershire districts. However, both the number of theft from vehicle and theft of vehicle offences recorded in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough in the first six months of 2008/09 is higher than in the previous year to date. <div>93 - 94</div>	No The vehicle crime rate in Hinckley and Bosworth is similar to the county rate. Also, compared to similar local authorities, Hinckley and Bosworth has an average vehicle crime rate. <div>95 - 96</div>	Yes The vehicle crime rates in the 'urban' and 'rural' areas of Hinckley and Bosworth Borough are similar to the county rates. Using the OAC classification, this translates to a relatively small proportion of residents living in the 'countryside' areas (18%) disproportionately affected by vehicle crime offences (26%). 1 of the 18 areas in Leicestershire with a significantly high number of vehicle crime offences is within Hinckley and Bosworth Borough: Hinckley Town Centre. <div>95 - 100</div>	Yes The proportion of Hinckley and Bosworth Borough respondents worried about being a victim of car crime ranked second, after burglary, when considering the list of eight possible crime categories. <div>28 - 29</div>	The group at highest risk of being a victim of vehicle crime proved to be males aged between 18 and 22 years of age, living in either a 'Town and Fringe' or 'Village' area. However, this profile changes slightly when considering the composite offences that make up vehicle crime. Individuals aged between 18 to 22 years and living in 'Village' areas are twice as likely as average of being a victim of theft from vehicle. Whereas males aged between 22 and 27 years and living in the OAC classified 'Blue Collar Communities' and 'Constrained by Circumstances' are four times more likely than average of being a victim of theft or unauthorised taking of motor vehicle. <div>105</div>

The overall reduction of 16% is similar to the county trend over the five year period. However, the number of burglary other offences recorded in Hinckley and Bosworth Borough in the first six months of 2008/09 is higher than in the previous year to date. <div>85 - 86</div>	No The burglary other offence rate in Hinckley and Bosworth is similar to the county rate. Also, compared to similar local authorities, Hinckley and Bosworth has an average burglary other offence rate. <div>87 - 88</div>	Yes The burglary other rates in the 'urban' and 'rural' areas of Hinckley and Bosworth Borough are similar to the county rates. They are also significantly less likely to be from a BME group rather than White-British and are more likely to aged 18 to 44, and less likely to be under 18 or over 45 year old.
